Jefferson High School Changes **Graduation Requirements**

During the winter of 2014, the State of Wisconsin passed Senate Bill 51 which requires an increase in graduation requirements for all Wisconsin public high school graduates in the areas of both math and science. In the past, public high schools in Wisconsin were required to have a minimum of 2 credits of math and 2 credits of science in their school board graduation policies. There were some high schools which already required more credits of math and/or science, but the past law required a minimum of 2 credits of each math and science.

Senate Bill 51 now requires that graduates have 3 credits of math and 3 credits of science. This new requirement brings Wisconsin in line with other Midwestern States such as Minnesota, Michigan, Illinois, Iowa, and

Thus, the new requirements for Jefferson High School will reflect the following changes:

Typically, when local school boards make changes to the graduation policy, the new policy goes into effect for upcoming 8th or 7^{tl} graders. This practice allows for the current high school students to be "grandfathered" into the old policy. The current high school students often times have a 4-year plan they have mapped out for their high school career, so this graduated approach tends to allow current high school students the opportunity to follow their plan. This graduated approach also allows the incoming high school students the proper time to prepare. Additionally, this approach provides high school teachers time to write and prepare for new courses as well as time to budget and hire for the new mandated

Although the increase in rigor through Senate Bill 51 is widely supported by JHS and the School District, it does provide for a challenge in the sense that when this Bill was passed this past winter, it went into effect for current freshmen students; therefore, a traditional graduated approach was not an option. This will force many schools, Jefferson included, to quickly ensure the appropriate availability of courses for students entering their junior year. To meet this challenge, the JHS math and science departments immediately began planning for the new change.

Unique to Senate Bill 51 is the allowance for various Agriculture, Technology Education, Family and Consumer Education, and potentially Business Education courses to count toward the third credit of math and science. Through STEM (Science Technology Engineering and Math) courses, math and science curricula is appropriately and logically applied. These courses go through a rigorous process in order to earn both DPI and local school board approval. The "crosswalk" between the applied courses and the science/math classes help to better ensure that science and math standards are being met. To date, Sarah Whitley- JHS Agriculture Teacher, Kim Hart- JHS Family and Consumer Education Teacher, and Jerry Burr- JHS Technology & Engineering Teacher have worked vigorously on dual credit courses in their respective areas. Excitedly, some of these have already been approved by both the DPI and the Jefferson School Board.

A committee was utilized in order to propose the new graduation requirements sited above in this article. The members of the committee were Kirsten Jurcek (parent), Mark Kurtz (school counselor), Tammy Kuehl (science teacher), Cory Brummeyer (Business Education teacher), Barb Johnson (Curriculum and Instruction Director), Mark Rollefson (High School Principal), Sandy Martin (local business; Anderson Machining), Dave Volk (School Board Member), Kathleen Folbrecht (Jefferson Graduate of 2008 and Admissions Office Personnel for UW), and Bryce Wegner (current JHS student).

This wide range of members allowed for some great discussion from the perspective of educators, college admissions, current and past students, parents, and employers. One of the concerns to consider was that the increase in graduation requirements of math and science from 2 credits each to 3 credits each reduces the number of elective credits that students can choose. Many of our students shared that this was a common issue prior to the increase. Unfortunately, the new requirements have the potential to constrain these students' schedules even further.

To potentially alleviate this, the committee considered eliminating the requirements of 1 credit of vocational and 1 credit of humanities credits. However, these courses help students experience a well-rounded education by exposing them to a variety of course disciplines. Upon further investigation, course trends illustrated that the vast majority of students take vocational and humanities credits anyway, regardless of the requirement. It is also noteworthy that the newly adopted Senate Bill 51 not only endorses, but encourages the crosswalk courses as mentioned earlier in this article. Through this option, many students will meet math and/or science credit requirements with the third credit coming from the vocational education department.

The decrease in social studies credits from 3.5 credits to 3.0 credits not only continues to meet state requirements, it also matches the credit value that the vast majority of area high schools require. This, too, will continue to ensure challenging social studies curricula while allowing students continued access to electives tailored to career and post-secondary plans.

JHS Greenhouse Grand Opening

The School District of Jefferson and the Jefferson Agriculture Advisory Board would like to invite the public to help us celebrate the addition of our new greenhouse to our programming and learning.

The Jefferson High School greenhouse building project has reached completion. A grand opening celebration is scheduled for October 5, 2014. The reception will start at 1:00 pm and conclude at 5:00 p.m. We will hear from Sarah Whitley- JHS Agriculture Teacher and FFA adviser,



Vern Georgson- retired JHS Agriculture teacher, and we are anticipating an address from The State of Wisconsin Superintendent Tony Evers. Mr. Evers has been invited and we are hopeful he can join us in this celebration.

The evening event will include tours of the Ag facility, tours of the new greenhouse, and tours of the Jefferson facility for those who wish to tour the entire building. Additionally, we plan to thank our donors and contractors for their assistance.

The Jefferson Agriculture Advisory Committee, led by retired Jefferson Agriculture teacher LaVern Georgson, spearheaded this project starting in 2012. The need for a new greenhouse to accompany the Agriculture Department at Jefferson High School was identified and plans and fundraising followed. An outpouring of community support over the past 2 years ensued, totaling over \$26,000 in contractors and in kind donations, and over \$57,000 in cash donations.



"The prospect of this structure for use by the entire school district holds much opportunity for hands on learning," says instructor Sarah Whitley. The

Agriculture Department curriculum now contains two greenhouse specific classes to be offered this current school year. Additionally, partnerships with the school lunch program, the Jefferson County Master Gardeners, and the Science Department at JHS are already in the works. Current Agriculture Instructor Sarah Whitley also looks forward to possible fall and spring plant sales for the Agriculture Department.

Recognition for the supporters of this project will be provided through the Giving Tree and Donor Pathway. The Giving Tree will be mounted in the Jefferson High School commons, with each donor and contractor named. The Donor Pathway will be installed to the south of the greenhouse using engraved bricks to thank donors. Bricks continue to be available for purchase for \$100.00 each. Steps for requesting letters of recommendation:

- 1. Check to see if the schools to which you are applying require them! (UW-Madison requires two!)
- 2. Recommendations should typically come from core academic teachers
- Complete a Letter of Recommendation form for each teacher from whom you are requesting a letter (form available on the district website).
- 4. Submit these completed forms to the teachers (allowing at least one week).
- 5. Request that each teacher: email a copy of the letter to counseling for electronic transfer which will require you to complete an *Upload Request Form.* (only for college apps, not scholarships)
- 6. Print at least 5 original hard copies with signatures.
- 7. Be sure to send a thank you note.

Wisconsin's Youth Options program allows juniors and seniors who meet certain requirements to take post-secondary courses at a UW institution, a Wisconsin technical college or one of the state's participating private nonprofit institutions of higher education. Approved courses can count toward high school graduation, as well as for college credit. Under Youth Options a student will not have to pay for a college course if the school board determines the course qualifies for high school credit and is not comparable to a course already offered in the school district. If the course is approved by the school board, the student can receive one-quarter high school credit for every one college credit earned upon successful completion of the course. A student who successfully completes his or her high school graduation requirements will earn a high school diploma regardless of whether the requirements were met while attending the high school or a college. To obtain the necessary forms or to discuss the possibility of participating in the Youth Options program, contact the Jefferson High School Counseling office. Applications for enrollment in the Youth Options program must be made by October 1st for the spring semester. The request will be presented to the School Board and the student will receive notification of the board's decision.—Wisconsin DPI Youth Options Brochure

Ordering High School Transcripts

Step 1: To Access Deliver Latest Transcript:

- Sign in to your **Parchment Account**
- Go to the **My Transcripts** tab

Select Deliver Latest Transcript next to your school name under My Schools, My Transcripts on the Manage page

Step 2: Select Destination Type:

- Select Destination Type (not all of these tabs may appear for you; the tabs you see are dependent on the service and settings of your sending school)
- Academic Destinations (type in the Institution Name and click Search. Select the radio button next to the correct school in the search results)
- The NCAA (type in your NCAA ID)
- The Common Application (type in your Common App ID, and click Submit)
- Myself (select your preferred delivery method)
- Other Destinations (fill in the Destination Information and Delivery Method)
- Click Save & Continue to continue your order or Save & Add Another to send your transcript to multiple destinations

Step 3: Confirm Your Destinations and Delivery Details:

- 1. Select the **Transcript Type** if you are currently enrolled at the sending school; you may choose to send your **Current Transcript** or **Next Grading Period Transcript**
- 2. You may enter an **Application Tracking Number** or fill in the **Testing** field in the **Delivery Information** section
- 3. If the delivery details look correct, select **Save & Continue** or **Add Additional Destinations** to send your transcript to multiple destinations.

Step 4: Payment:

- 1. Fill in the applicable **Payment Information** and **Billing Information**
- 2. Click Submit

Step 5: Deliver:

 Confirmation page will load with your delivery destinations listed; you may print this page for your records.

Freshman Only First Day

Welcome to Jefferson High School! That sentiment is exactly what incoming freshmen can expect from faculty and student ambassadors on September 2. The first day of high school can be an anxiety-ridden experience for many students, thus reserving the first day of classes for freshmen only has become a tradition at JHS. Not only will students be warmly greeted at the door, they can expect a structured day focused on getting to know the staff and becoming acclimated with the building.

Upon entering the building, students report to their homeroom where they will participate in an icebreaking activity. This is followed by a short morning assembly. Mr. Rollefson, principal, will formally welcome students and introduce the administrative staff. At this point, students will also meet the freshman teachers. Afterwards, student ambassadors will take freshmen through a guided tour of the building, pointing out the high school's newest features.

Students will also learn the cafeteria procedures and have lunch. In the afternoon, students go through a mock schedule, where they will meet all of their teachers and see who is in their classes. Mr. Rollefson's closing remarks will emphasize the importance of making high school count.

JHS Parent Guide to Understanding the MAP Assessment (Measures of Academic Progress)

Questions to ask as a parent about MAP:

- Is my child growing as a learner?
- Is my child progressing at an appropriate rate?

What is MAP

Perhaps you mark your child's height on a chart every year to see how much he or she has grown? Just as your chart measures physical growth, the MAP test measures academic growth in science, mathematics, reading, & language arts.

Students in grades three through eleven are tested in math, reading, science, and language usage multiple times per year. Educators use the growth and achievement data from MAP to develop targeted instructional strategies and plans for school improvement.

MAP

- Is not an accountability test
- Generates test questions based on student responses
- Reports student results in RIT scores
- Gives immediate results
- Is aligned to Wisconsin's Common Core State Standards
- Measures growth over time Provides information used to target individual instructions

Student MAP Scores

A student's RIT score is an estimation of a student's instructional level. Comparing MAP scores taken during three times in the school-year gives educators a perspective on students' growth in learning. The graphs on each student's MAP report show national norm RIT scores, the District average score, and the student's score.

MAP results are one way to help determine if your child is performing at, above, or below grade level as compared to students around the District and across the nation.

The unit of measure on the MAP test is a RIT scale (short for Rasch unit). The RIT scale is an equal-interval scale much like feet and inches on a yardstick. This RIT scoring system helps teachers to pin point what students have learned and what students are now ready to learn.

Understanding the RIT Score (Rausch Unit)

A student's RIT score is an estimation of a student's instructional level. Comparing MAP scores taken during three times in the school year gives educators a perspective on students' growth in learning. The graphs on each student's MAP report show national norm RIT scores, the District average score, and the student's score.

MAP results are one way to help determine if your child is performing at, above, or below grade level as compared to students around the District and across the nation.

Keep in mind, the MAP test is one test at one point in time. It does not measure intelligence or a student's capacity for learning. When making important decisions about students, school staff members consider the MAP test results along with other important data such as classroom performance, other test scores, and input from parents and teachers.

Growth over time

We expect students' RIT scores to increase over time. Typically, younger students show more growth in one year than older students. Students who test above grade level often show less growth. Sometimes RIT scores may decline from one test to the next. One low test score is not cause for immediate concern. Like adults, students have good and bad days and their test results do not always indicate what they know. Students' attitudes toward the test can also affect their scores. Therefore, growth over time is a better measure of student learning.

As parents, guardians and adults, we all know that individuals grow and learn at different rates. With the MAP test, "anticipated" growth rates for each student are based on national norms and should be viewed as typical growth for learners, not expected growth. Our goal is for teachers to use the data to differentiate, in other words, use different approaches for different students, and to adjust their teaching so that students grow at levels appropriate to each of them. Teachers and principals will continue to participate in training to learn what the Map test results mean and how to utilize the results.

How does a student exempt themselves from the MAP Test?

JHS juniors and seniors do not have to take the MAP test. This test is only administered to freshmen and sophomore students. For this upcoming 2014-15 school year, only about 40% of the freshmen and sophomores will be required to take the test. The other 60% of the freshmen and sophomores are exempt due to the high scores they earned when they took the test this past spring during 8th or 9th grade.

Students take the MAP test from grades Kindergarten through 10th grade. If during their 8th, 9th, or 10th grade school year the student earns a MAP RIT score that is equivalent or greater than a RIT score of a second semester sophomore, the student is exempt from the test. They do not have to take that content test again....ever!

JHS gives the MAP test to non-exempt 9th and 10th graders in the fall and spring of 9th grade and again in the fall and spring of 10th grade.

JHS utilizes four MAP tests. Those four tests are Reading, Language Arts, Math, and Science. Each of these tests has a RIT score that correlates to student performance equivalent to the end of his/her sophomore year of high school. As explained earlier in this article, this RIT score is nationally normed.

In order to be exempt from taking MAP Reading, MAP Language Arts, MAP Math, and/ or MAP Science, a student must earn a minimum RIT score per the chart below:

MAP Reading = RIT 224+
MAP Language Arts = RIT 223+
MAP Math = RIT 237+
MAP Science = RIT 215+

Again, these RIT scores are nationally normed and indicates that a student is performing at a level equivalent to that of a second semester sophomore. It is noteworthy and exciting to note that approximately 60% of our 8th and 9th graders performed at the level of a second semester sophomore which in turn allows these students to be exempt from taking those specific tests.

JHS Band Trip 2014





A highlight of the trip by many was a visit to the Cotton Club, a world famous jazz club in the 1920's and home to Duke Ellington's orchestra for many years. Students were served a delicious dinner buffet and then danced the night away to the music of the live jazz combo. Our very own Sarah Koeppel even sang one song with the combo and did an outstanding job.

JHS ENFORCES DRESS CODE

Jefferson High School prides itself as being a place where students can enjoy their freedom to get involved in many activities, choose their classes of interest, and express their individuality. Although we respect a student's right to make these choices, we also need to set 3. Pants worn in such a way that appropriate standards.

In light of recent trends in dress, we, as an educational institution, feel the need to establish a more specific dress code to limit the definition of clothing that is appropriate for our educational setting. As always, garments bearing offensive words or offensive slogans including references to alcohol, tobacco, drugs, or sexual activity are not allowed. In addition, hats, hoods, bandanas, and other headwear are not acceptable during the school day.

The following additional guidelines have been established.

1. No bare midriffs, open-back shirts, halter tops, strapless

- shirts, spaghetti straps, or single strap shirts may be worn. All shirts must have straps that are at least 2 inches thick. All shirts must cover the back, stomach, and cleavage.
- 2. Very short mini-skirts, dresses, or shorts are not appropriate for school.
- undergarments are visible will not be allowed. Neither wallet nor hip chains should be worn at school.
- 4. No coats may be worn in the classroom. In case of colder than usual classrooms, students should be prepared with appropriate clothing.
- 5. Gang-affiliated jewelry or dress of any kind will not be allowed.
