Dear Parent/Guardian,

The school year is well underway as our new freshmen transition through the first year of their high school experience. Each year, the Counseling Department, in accordance with the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction’s School Counseling Standards, schedules individual planning conferences with freshmen students in the months of October/November.

Each conference will not only review a student’s academic progress, but also discuss social acclimation, along with goal-setting for the future. Additionally, counselors will share resources for success such as time management, organization, and study skills referencing our commitment to AVID and Brain-Based study strategies. When necessary, intervention-based services are assessed, as well. This structure is designed to guide students, individually, to achieve maximum success in high school, to identify support services/resources, and to plan for life beyond graduation.

Your student’s individual planning conference will take place with his/her assigned counselor within his/her study hall hour during the months of October/November. If your student does not have a study hall, appointments can be made during IE. Each appointment should take no longer than 30 minutes. All content for the conference can be found in Schoology Class of 2026 under “freshmen conferencing”. Counselors will determine whether further follow-up is needed.

Congratulations to Brian Siegler!



On September 14, 2022, the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC®) announced the names of 16,000 semifinalists in the 68th annual National Merit Scholarship Program. These academically talented high school seniors have an opportunity to continue in the competition for some 7,250 National Merit Scholarships worth nearly \$28 million that will be offered next spring. To be considered for a Merit Scholarship® award, semifinalists must fulfill several requirements to advance to the finalist level of the competition. About 95 percent of the semifinalists are expected to attain finalist standing, and approximately half of the finalists will win a National Merit Scholarship, earning the Merit Scholar® title.

High school juniors entered the 2023 National Merit Scholarship Program by taking the 2021 PSAT, which served as an initial screen of program entrants. The nationwide pool of semifinalists, representing less than one percent of U.S. high school seniors, includes the highest-scoring entrants in each state. The number of semifinalists in a state is proportional to the state's percentage of the national total of graduating seniors.

To become a finalist, the semifinalist and a high school official must submit a detailed scholarship application, in which they provide information about the semifinalist's academic record, participation in school and community activities, demonstrated leadership abilities, employment, and honors and awards received. A semifinalist must have an outstanding academic record throughout high school, be endorsed and recommended by a high school official, write an essay, and earn SAT® or ACT® scores that confirm the student's earlier performance on the qualifying test.

15,000 semifinalists will advance to the finalist level, and in February they will be notified of this designation. All National Merit Scholarship winners will be selected from this group of finalists. Merit Scholar designees are selected on the basis of their skills, accomplishments, and potential for success in rigorous college studies, without regard to gender, race, ethnic origin, or religious preference.

Three types of National Merit Scholarships will be offered in the spring of 2023. Every finalist will compete for one of 2,500 National Merit® \$2,500 scholarships that will be awarded on a state-representational basis. About 950 corporate-sponsored merit scholarship awards will be provided by approximately 180 corporations and business organizations for finalists who meet their specified criteria, such as children of the grantor's employees or residents of communities where sponsor plants or offices are located. In addition, about 160 colleges and universities are expected to finance some 3,800 college-sponsored merit scholarship awards for finalists who will attend the sponsor institution.

National Merit Scholarship winners of 2023 will be announced in four nationwide news releases beginning April and concluding in July. These scholarship recipients will join nearly 368,000 other distinguished young people who have earned the Merit Scholar title.



College Board Awards

Congratulations to Seniors Ashley Olmos García, Brian Siegler, and Rowan Wilson, who have been recognized by the College Board. Ashley received the National Hispanic Recognition Award (NHRA), while Brian and Rowan received the National Rural and Small Town Award (NRSTA). Award winners have a grade-point average of at least 3.5, and they have either scored in the top 10% of their state on the PSAT test or earned a score of 3 or more on two separate AP Exams. These awards are academic recognition that students can include on applications for college and/or scholarships. Great work, JHS students!

Completing the FAFSA is easier than you think!
Start your FAFSA today!

STEP 1: Choose your device

Working from a computer? Go to <https://studentaid.gov/fafsa>

Working from a phone? Download the myStudentAid app

STEP 2: Connect with your parent(s)

The FAFSA will be completed by both the student and at least one parent.

- If your biological or adoptive parents live together, include both of their information.
- If not, include information about the parent that you lived with the most during the previous 12 months and that person's spouse (if married).
- Still unsure which parent(s) information to include? Search [fafsa-parent.pdf](#) for more details.

STEP 3: Create Student & Parent FSA IDs (if you don't already have one)

- The FSA ID can be used to electronically sign and submit the FAFSA.
- Use your Social Security number, birthdate, and legal name (no nicknames).
- Don't use the same email address for the student and parent, they'll each need their own email to log in.
- Use email addresses that you'll have access to throughout college, not a high school email address.
- Eligible students can complete the FAFSA without parent FSA ID by mailing in a paper signature page when they submit the FAFSA.

STEP 4: Answer the FAFSA questions

The student will log in and the student and parent will work together to answer questions on the FAFSA form. You can save your progress and return to the FAFSA before submitting.

STEP 5: Submit the FAFSA

Both the student and a parent will use their own FSA ID or print a signature page to sign and submit their information on the FAFSA.

STEP 6: Check your email

You'll receive an email as soon as your FAFSA is processed. FAFSA will also send your information directly to every college that you listed on your FAFSA application. Once you're accepted to that college, the college will send you financial aid award information.

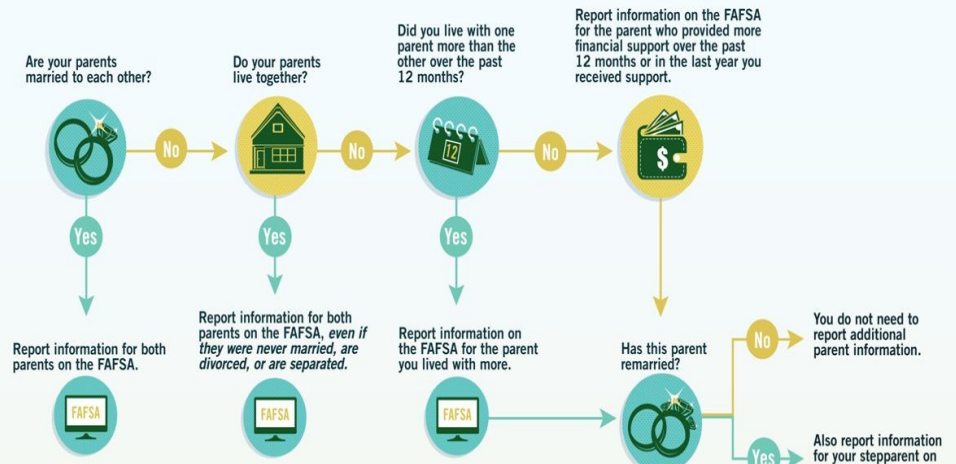

WHO'S MY PARENT WHEN I FILL OUT MY FAFSA?

Dependent students are required to report parent information on the *Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)*. For reporting purposes, "PARENT" means your legal (biological or adoptive) parent or stepparent, or a person that the state has determined to be your legal parent.

Use this guide to figure out which parent's information to include (depending on your family situation).



The following people are not your parents unless they have legally adopted you:

The IRS Data Retrieval Tool (IRS DRT) Electronically Transfers Your Federal Tax Return Information Into Your FAFSA Form

1 Log in to your current FAFSA form or start a new application at fafsa.gov.

3 Click the "Link to IRS" button and log in with your FSA ID to be transferred to the IRS to retrieve your info.

5 Check the "Transfer My Tax Information into the FAFSA form" box, and click the "Transfer Now" button.*

2 In the finances section of the online form, you will see a "Link to IRS" button if you are eligible to use the IRS DRT.

4 Once at the IRS site, enter your information exactly as it appears on your federal income tax return and click the "Submit" button.

6 You will know that your federal tax return information has been successfully transferred because the words "Transferred from the IRS" will display in place of the IRS information in your FAFSA form.



*For your protection, your tax information will not be displayed on either the IRS site or fafsa.gov.

AP Test Sign-Up Timeline

September

- AP teachers add students to AP database.
- Students sign up for AP tests.

October

- Students continue AP test sign-up. **Students must login to MyAP Classroom and change their order status from Undecided to Yes or No.**
- Students bring AP test payments to counseling office. Payments are due by November 1.
- AP exam fee - \$97 per test.

November 1

- AP test sign-up deadline
- AP test payments due to the counseling office

November 15

- AP tests are ordered
- Late fee - \$40 per test after this date
- Cancellation fee - \$40 after this date

May

- AP tests begin on Monday, May 1 and end Friday, May 12

2022-23 JHS Student Attendance & Parental/Guardian Responsibilities

This message is for students, parents, and caregivers to have a better understanding of student attendance in the SDoJ. This is a notification according to Wisconsin State Statute, and the School District of Jefferson, that each student shall not be absent no more than 5 days of school, during one semester of school. A total of 10 days, during the 2022-23 School Year. If the student exceeds the hours of absence, the student is considered a "Habitual Truant" as per the School District of Jefferson & the State of Wisconsin.

(1) In this section:

(a) "**Habitual truant**" means a pupil who is absent from school without an acceptable excuse under sub. (4) and s. [118.15](#) for part or all of 5 or more days on which school is held during a school semester.

(b) "School attendance officer" means an employee designated by the school board to deal with matters relating to school attendance and truancy. "School attendance officer" does not include an individual designated under sub. [\(2m\) \(a\)](#) to take into custody a child who is absent from school without an acceptable excuse under s. [118.15](#) unless that individual has also been designated by the school board to deal with matters relating to school attendance and truancy.

(c) "**Truancy**" means any absence of part or all of one or more days from school during which the school attendance officer, principal, or teacher has not been notified of the legal cause of such absence by the parent or guardian of the absent pupil, and also means intermittent attendance carried on for the purpose of defeating the intent of s. [118.15](#).

Failure to comply with the above attendance expectations set by the School District of Jefferson and the State of Wisconsin will/could result in the following (in no particular order) - JHS Student Handbook pg. 14-15:

- 5 Day Letter of absence from school
- 10 Day Letter of absence from school
- After 10 accumulated days of absence a doctor must excuse the student's absence from school in writing.
- Saturday School
- Municipal Citation Truancy Ticket
- Community Service
- Jefferson County Habitual Truancy Referral
- Seniors will not be able to participate in the graduation ceremony (90% attendance requirement - JHS Student Handbook pg. 11-12).

2022-23 JHS Asistencia de los estudiantes y responsabilidades de los padres o tutores

(1) En esta sección:

(a) "Ausente habitual" significa un alumno que está ausente de la escuela sin una excusa aceptable bajo sub. (4) y art. 118.15 para parte o la totalidad de 5 o más días en los que se lleva a cabo la escuela durante un semestre escolar.

(b) "Oficial de asistencia escolar" significa un empleado designado por la junta escolar para tratar asuntos relacionados con la asistencia escolar y el ausentismo escolar. "Oficial de asistencia escolar" no incluye a un individuo designado bajo sub. (2m) (a) tomar en custodia a un niño que está ausente de la escuela sin una excusa aceptable bajo s. 118.15 a menos que esa persona también haya sido designada por la junta escolar para tratar asuntos relacionados con la asistencia escolar y el ausentismo escolar.

(c) "Absentismo" significa cualquier ausencia de parte o la totalidad de uno o más días de la escuela durante la cual el oficial de asistencia escolar, el director o el maestro no han sido notificados de la causa legal de dicha ausencia por parte del padre o tutor del estudiante ausente. alumno, y también significa asistencia intermitente llevada a cabo con el fin de derrotar la intención de s. [118.15](#).

El incumplimiento de las expectativas de asistencia establecidas por el Distrito Escolar de Jefferson y el Estado de Wisconsin dará como resultado lo siguiente (sin ninguna orden en particular): Manual del estudiante de JHS, pág. 14-15:

- Carta de 5 días de ausencia de la escuela
- Carta de 10 días de ausencia de la escuela
- Después de 10 días acumulados de ausencia, un médico debe justificar la ausencia del estudiante de la escuela por escrito.
- Escuela sabatina.
- Multa de citación municipal por ausentismo escolar.
- Servicio comunitario.
- Referencia de ausentismo habitual del condado de Jefferson.
- Los estudiantes del último año no podrán participar en la ceremonia de graduación (requisito de asistencia del 90 % - Manual del estudiante de JHS, págs. 11-12).

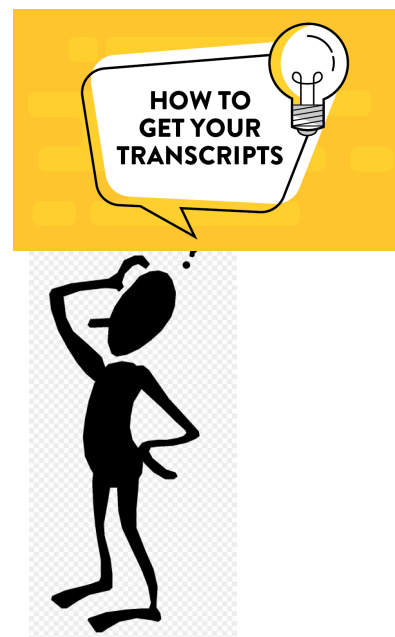
To All Prospective 2023 Jefferson High School Graduation Participants

Any eligible student participating in Jefferson High School graduation must have an appropriate cap and gown (maroon for all). Seniors will be required to attend a presentation in the auditorium during homeroom on November 16 regarding ordering of graduation materials. This information will also be shared with parents after the November homeroom presentation. Students will be placing their orders on November 22 during their lunch period.

DO NOT USE YOUR SCHOOL EMAIL WHEN YOU CREATE YOUR ACCOUNT!
3. Once you have created your account, request your transcript.
4. When you click on the ORDER button, you will be asked where you want to send your transcript to. You can either search for a college/university/technical school or choose to send the transcript to yourself or another individual.
5. When choosing to send your transcript to an employer, trades program, etc., you will be asked to provide the recipient's name and email address.
6. If choosing to send by mail, you will be required to provide additional information. Mailing transcripts will take significantly longer to process. Electronic deliver is **ALWAYS** the fastest!
7. Processing a transcript request can take anywhere from 24-72 hours. Please plan accordingly! **The Parchment portal is checked once a day, Monday-Friday.**

SENIOR PHOTO SUBMISSION GUIDELINES

From the student handbook:

Jefferson High School prides itself as being a place where students can enjoy their freedom to get involved in many activities, choose their classes of interest, and express their individuality. Although we respect a student's right to make these choices, we also need to set appropriate standards. In light of recent trends in dress, we, as an educational institution, feel the need to establish a more specific dress code to limit the definition of clothing that is appropriate for our educational setting. As always, garments bearing offensive words or offensive slogans including references to alcohol, tobacco, drugs, gangs or sexual activity are not allowed. Hats and other headgear (other than for religious and/or medical purposes), such as, visors, hoods, or bandannas/headbands on the forehead, are not to be worn in the school building. These items should be kept in your locker during the school day. This excludes; pony tail holders, hair clips, and hair accessories with the purpose of keeping hair out of students' eyes.

Building Administrators will have the final decision-making authority in all matters related to dress code and your senior photo submission.

Recommended:

1. Jefferson High School uniforms for sports, music, or extra-curricular activities.
2. Props that are school appropriate. For example, these may include sports gear, flowers, books, or musical instruments. Props that are not school related are prohibited.
3. Nature settings that involve things like sunflowers, fallen leaves, or water are also encouraged.

Simply put, please provide a senior yearbook picture that is formal/semi-formal and is appropriate. This will be captured in the yearbook forever. Make your photo something that you can be proud of. Thanks.

Please be aware that we accept close up or long shots for student photos, yet we reserve the right to edit said photo in order to fit in the space provided.

Submitting photos:

Preferably, we would like you or your photographer to submit a photo electronically. Please email to beilw@sdoj.org or copy onto a CD. We appreciate the photos to be of highest quality, at least 300 pixels/square inch. If this is not possible, we will enhance it ourselves.

To submit a photo manually, please send a wallet-size photo to Mr. Beil in room 104 at the high school. Please note that the photo will not be returned.

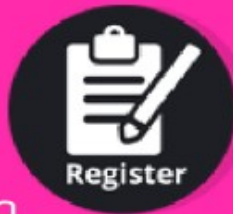

College vs Apprenticeship

What Kind of Education is Right for You?

When exploring possible career choices, there are many things to consider. An extremely important aspect of any career is the training and education it requires. As you research possible occupations, be sure to review the kind of training needed to be successful. Although most career-level occupations require post-secondary education, they do not necessarily require a four-year bachelor's degree.

In construction there are many different types of careers. Engineers, architects, estimators, and project managers often require a four year degree or beyond. At the field level, completing an apprenticeship program is a recognized achievement—one that can open the door to multiple possibilities.

When choosing a career, earning potential is a key thing to consider. You want to be in a career path that will allow you to support yourself and your family. So how does apprenticeship stack up against a college degree?

Dollars and What Makes Sense for You

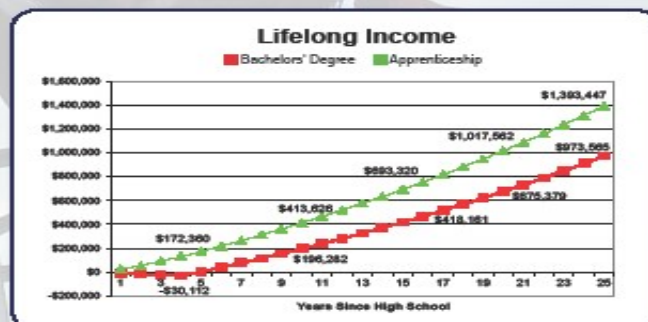
Many times, people think that you have to earn a bachelor's degree in order to be successful. Consider this example of two people — one who gets a bachelor's degree from a public university and the other one completes an electrical apprenticeship.

An average public university student in Wisconsin spends approximately \$7,500 per year on tuition, not counting room, board, or books. An electrical apprentice will spend approximately \$2,000 on program costs per year for five years, although many employers have a tuition reimbursement program.

Assuming the college student finishes in four years and starts work immediately after graduation with a starting pay of \$35,000 a year with 3% increases each year, the college graduate will earn approximately a grand total of \$974,000 by the time his or her 25th high school reunion comes around.

On the other hand, the electrical apprentice will earn more than \$150,000 while in a five year apprenticeship program (apprentices are paid both on the job and when attending class). Assuming the same 3% raise every year, the electrician will earn nearly \$1,400,000 in the same 25 years after high school.

Of course, there are a number of variables which can affect this calculation one way or another, but it demonstrates that a career in construction can be financially rewarding.



What is Hope Squad?

- + Hope Squads reduce youth suicide through education, training, and peer intervention.

- + Hope Squad members are trained by advisors.
- + They are not taught to act as counselors.
- + They are taught how to be peer advocates, recognize signs of suicide contemplation, and respectfully report any concerns to an adult.
- + Hope Squads are the eyes and ears of the school.
- + High school Hope Squad curriculum develops an understanding of suicide prevention awareness, mental health, and self-care.

Last spring, students were peer nominated to be HOPE Squad members for the 2022-2023 school year. This year is the first year of implementation at SDOJ and our HOPE Squad members are ready to be trained in helping support and advocate for their peers. THE ROLE OF HOPE IN SUICIDE PREVENTION

A new school year commonly brings a new sense of hope for kids. Your children may be feeling hopeful that they will learn a lot, do well in class, make a sports team, or earn a top spot in orchestra. Visualizing themselves accomplishing these things can lead to an increased sense of happiness, satisfaction, and hope.

That hope can also provide protection against suicide risk. Individuals who practice and nourish hope tend to feel more motivation even in the face of discouragement. Hope is crucial in suicide prevention because hope is what helps someone decide to stay. Fortunately, hope is a learnable skill. Below are a few ideas for how you and your children can build hope to help protect against suicide risk.

Steps for Building Hope:

- * **Visualize.** Help your child look to the future and see in their minds what it would be like to achieve their hopes. Help them ponder how this bright future feels. You can also create a picture of these hopes to hang somewhere you and your child can see it every day.
- * **Notice others' hope.** Read about others' hope. Talk to hopeful individuals about their hopes and successes.
- * **Write in a hope journal.** Detail your hopes in a notebook. For hopes that involve a goal, be sure to break the goal into small steps. You may need to make several plans for a goal, and remember to give yourself grace if that goal needs to shift or change along the way.

SIGNS OF HOPELESSNESS

Below are a few warning signs that could indicate hopelessness in children.

- * Increased irritability
- * Decreased interest in activities
- * Unusual changes in eating or sleeping habits
- * Excessive feelings of guilt
- * Substance use
- * Trouble concentrating
- * Complaining of frequent aches and pains
- * Being self-critical

If you notice these signs and they last for a week or two, consider taking the following steps:

- * **Talk with your children.** Regularly check in with them on how they're feeling and what's going on in their lives. Express your concern when needed and ask questions kindly.
- * **Talk with other adults.** There are many adults in your children's lives: teachers, coaches, church leaders, and extended family. Ask if they've noticed any abnormal behavior from your children.
- * **Talk with a mental health professional.** Without your children, meet with a mental health professional to discuss your concerns and get more information on how to help your children.

Mexican artist Frida Kahlo is remembered for her self-portraits, pain and passion, and bold, vibrant colors. She is celebrated in Mexico for her attention to Mexican and indigenous culture and by feminists for her depiction of the female experience and form.

Kahlo, who suffered from polio as a child, nearly died in a bus accident as a teenager. She suffered multiple fractures of her spine, collarbone and ribs, a shattered pelvis, broken foot and a dislocated shoulder. She began to focus heavily on painting while recovering in a body cast. In her lifetime, she had 30 operations.

Life experience is a common theme in Kahlo's approximately 200 paintings, sketches and drawings. Her physical and emotional pain are depicted starkly on canvases. Of her 143 paintings, 55 are self-portraits.

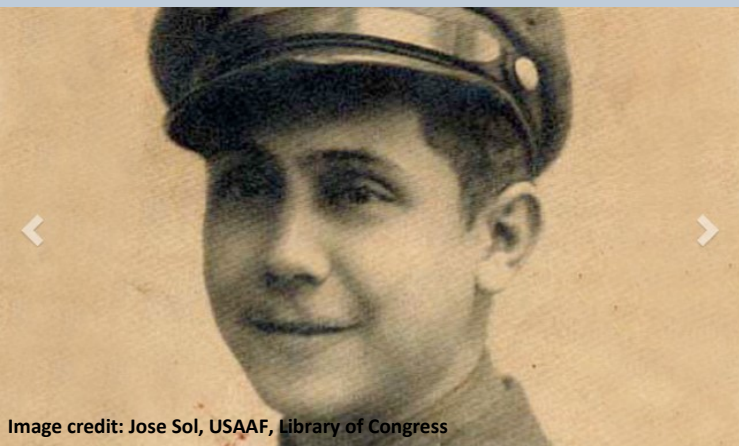

When to stay home from school

This time of year is when it seems like your friends and family start to pick up more illnesses or influenza (the flu). While it can be hard to miss school, it's important that if you are sick, you give yourself the chance to feel better, and to help prevent the spread of illnesses and germs.

If you are sick, you should stay home from school and away from crowds until they are feeling better and have been *symptom free for at least 24 hours; fever free without the use of medicine such as Tylenol or Motrin; and if prescribed, on antibiotics for at least 24 hours.*

Symptoms that can indicate illness or influenza include:

- Fever (greater than 100.5°)
 - Cough
 - Sore Throat
 - Body Aches
 - Headache
 - Tiredness
 - Diarrhea
 - Vomiting

If you do become ill, you can prevent the spread of illness by washing your hands often and coughing and sneezing into a tissue or elbow, and not on your hands. Take time to rest, and drink plenty of fluids to stay hydrated.

If you have questions about symptoms, talk to your parent/guardian and they can contact your Healthcare Provider.

Covid-19 Vaccines

The COVID-19 vaccine is available to everyone 6 months and up and is effective at helping to protect against severe disease and death from variants of the virus that causes COVID-19.

Contact your Primary Care Provider to schedule an appointment or to discuss any concerns you may have about the vaccine.

Provider Expertise

From Heidi Jennrich, CPNP at Fort HealthCare Internal Medicine & Pediatrics:

"One the very important part of health that gets overlooked is the importance of good sleep. So many kids are staying up late on school nights and sleep deprived. How many hours would your child sleep if not woken? This is how many hours they need on school nights. Lack of sleep effects their school performance, their mental health and overall health.

1. So be consistent in bedtime routine.
2. Turn off electronic and have them out the room at night."

Flu season is right around the corner. With Coronavirus still being a threat, it's important that all individuals 6 months and older plan to receive the flu vaccine in 2022.

By getting the flu vaccine early, the body has time for immunity to build and to help build a defense against a virus that could potentially hurt you, your family and those around you.

Cuándo quedarse en casa sin ir a la escuela

En esta época del año es cuando parece que tus amigos y familiares comienzan a contraer más enfermedades o la gripe (influenza). Aunque puede ser difícil faltar a la escuela, es importante que si estás enfermo, tengas la oportunidad de sentirte mejor y ayudes a prevenir la propagación de enfermedades y gérmenes.

Si estás enfermo, debes permanecer en casa y alejado de las multitudes hasta que te sientas mejor y *no tengas síntomas durante al menos 24 horas; sin fiebre y sin el uso de medicamentos como Tylenol o Motrin; y si se los recetan, con antibióticos durante al menos 24 horas.*

Los síntomas que pueden indicar una enfermedad o una gripe son:

- Fiebre (superior a 100.5°)
 - Tos
- Dolor de garganta
- Dolor en el cuerpo
- Dolor de cabeza
 - Cansancio
 - Diarrea
 - Vómitos

Si enfermas, puedes evitar el contagio de la enfermedad lavándote las manos con frecuencia y tosiendo y estornudando en un pañuelo o en el codo, y no en las manos. Tómate tiempo para descansar y bebe mucho líquido para mantenerte hidratado.

Si tienes preguntas sobre los síntomas, habla con tus padres/tutores y ellos pueden ponerse en contacto con tu proveedor de atención médica.
